Teaching Ideas—Curriculum Connections

Prereading Ideas

Johnny's coach and his parents remind Johnny to play hockey in a way he can be proud of. While reading the story, have students locate the moment that shows Johnny has come to understand what his coach means by "playing in a way that you can be proud of yourself."

Classroom Discussion Questions

- 1. Johnny's cousin Sarah is always trying to help, but often her attempts at helping people aren't thought out very well. As a result she ends up creating problems rather than being helpful. Have the class list the four examples of Sarah's attempts at helping (the mousetrap/ the computer report/ the toothbrush/ the basement painting).
- 2. In chapter 3, what two things did Stu do that grossed Johnny out?
- 3. After Dayle tripped Johnny on the ice, what could Johnny have done instead of losing his temper and tackling Dayle? What lesson does Johnny learn from the incident about himself, sportsmanship and playing well?
- 4. At the tie-breaker game, Johnny makes a tough call on himself. What does he reveal to the referee about the goal?
